The Common European Framework

KID is an English language magazine based on indications provided by the Common European Framework. In relation to the three reference levels (basic speaker [A1, A2], independent speaker [B1, B2], proficient speaker [C1, C2]), KID magazine (intermediate level) is between level B1 and B2.

The magazine is composed of five numbers, with each one corresponding to a didactic unit. Each issue of Kid provides ready-made lessons which are both stimulating and easy to use. They can be used on their own or as an accompaniment to a course book. The particular structure of the magazine is ideal for :

- **having ready-made practical lessons, which are structured in 5 teaching units**
- **encouraging autonomous learning and self-assessment**
- **planning linguistic certification**
- **encouraging different subjects of study**

The students, after completing the series of magazines, will be able to understand key words of different topics and produce texts related to familiar topics, such as describing experiences and events, understanding the principal ideas of complex texts on both concrete and abstract topics.

How KID is structured

1. Each issue of the magazine is structured around a **teaching unit** which is based on the report on pages 5, 6 and 7 and the revision games on page 15, as well as grammar and lexical points on other pages. This particular structure with the same topics that reappear, even if in a different form, proves to be particularly useful because:

- it gives the magazine a structure which, although based on one theme, is never monotonous
- it allows for the memorisation and continuous revision of lexis and grammar
- it permits students to put into practice what they have learnt

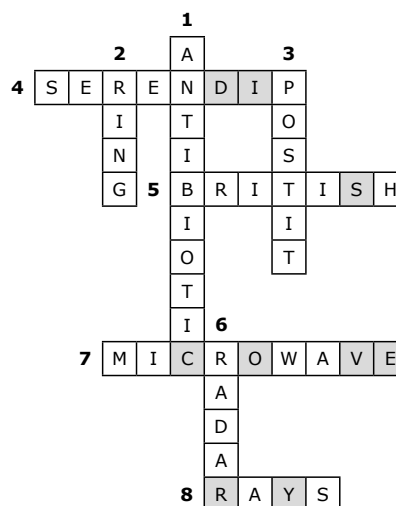
